# Our Garden Walk Experience By Mike and Cindy Bauman




In the last hours, we thought of what we would do for next year's walk and then realized we won't do it every year! That's how much fun we had. So in another 10 years or so we hope to do it all again!

# Log Cabin Heirloom Garden

The Log Cabin Heirloom Garden Team from the Mil-



ford Historical Society has been working with the Garden Club President Susan Absher, Outreach Coordinator Sue Grifor and the Log Cabin team Dianna Kline, Tami Averill, Barbara Hertz and Historical Society President Ron Wilson. The cabin and garden are representative of a homestead at the time of the first white settlers in the area. The garden shows the technique knows as the three sisters, (companion planting of corn, beans and squash in the same space). The cabin and garden are located in the park east of the fire station on GM Road. Please come out and take a look this summer.





# JOIN THE BATTLE. BEAT THE BUG

The spotted lanternfly is an invasive pest, primarily known to feed on tree of heaven, but has many other host plants, including grape, hop, apple, stone fruit, maple, poplar, walnut and willow. The insect changes hosts as it goes through its developmental stages. Nymphs feed on a wide range of plant species, while adults prefer to feed and lay eggs on the tree of heaven. Spotted lanternfly spread rapidly when introduced to new areas. While the insects can walk, jump,

or fly short distances its long distance spread is facilitated by people who move ifested materials or items containing egg mases. If allowed to spread in the United States, this pest could damage the country's grape, orchard and logging industries. The Spotted lanternfly has been identified in Oakland County, MI

For more information, or if you find an insect that you suspect is the spotted lanternfly please contact your local extension office to have the specimen identified properly.



# Key Lime Pie Mousse

# From Women's Day Magazine - June/July 2023 Serves 4 people

#### For Crumble:

4 Gram Crackers


3/4 Cup rolled Oats


1/3 Cup Packed light brown sugar

3 Tbsp all purpose flout

1/4 tsp salt

3 Tbsp cold butter cubed





#### For Mousse:

1 1/2 Cups heavy crean

1/4 Cup confectioner' sugar

1 cup sweetened condensed milk

1/3 cup key lime juice

1 tsp pure vanilla extract

Green food coloring to obtain color desired

- 1. Using electric mixer on medium, beat cream and confectioners' sugar until stiff peaks form, about 3 minutes. Transfer 1 cup whipped cream to piping bag fitted with star tip; refrigerate until ready to serve
- 2. In large bowl, whisk together condensed milk, lime juice, vanilla and a small drop of food coloring or enough to reach desired consistency. In 3 increments, add remaining whipped cream to lime mixture and gently fold in until just combined and no streaks remain (I used a whisk to fold in the whipped cream mixture). Cover and refrigerate until ready to assemble.

#### To Assemble:

Add about 1/4 cup crumble to each of 4 glasses or glass serving dish. Top with heaping 1/3 cup mousse, then repeat with second layer of crumble and mouse. Pipe reserved Whipped cream onto mouse. Top with any remaining crumble then garnish each glass with 1 lime slice and some lime zest if you wish. Refrigerate until ready to serve.

Audit Committee Meeting: The audit committee will consist of Jackie Swenson, Nancy Nordin and Cindy Bauman. They will meet in July (date to be determined) to review the books and records and ensure they are correct to close the business for this fiscal year as we usher in the new treasurer, Diane DeVincent. We thank Cindy Bauman for her four years of service as treasurer to the Milford Garden Club.

**Logo Update:** Susan and Nancy will be taking clothing items dropped off by members to Quick Silver for embroidery next Tuesday. A reminder was given to members that the area each person wishes their embroidery to go must be marked to identify the placement e.g., left side, right side, center and so forth. Pinning a small piece of paper at the location is most helpful along with your name on the paper so we will know who the garment belongs to when we give it to the printer. The garment will be identified by name on the invoice and also the proof before the final embroidery is done.

#### Officer's reports:

**Publicity:** Gail Cooper is circulating through the crowd tonight and taking pictures of members for our website directory which is only accessible by members. Amy will bring some of her products which will be available for sale before and after the meeting.

Treasurer's Report: There is a balance of \$6,874.61 in the Garden Club's bank account currently.

#### **Committees:**

Garden Walk: Linda Becker and Barb Amey reminded everyone that the Garden Walk is only two weeks away. There will be 6 baskets for the raffle and one lovely bench. There will be posters of the raffle items placed at each of the 7 homes on the walk along with raffle tickets to sell to garden visitors. Linda and Barb also reminded us of the pre-walk on Wednesday, June 21st. We will be meeting by the UPS store in the parking lot at Kroger's at 4:30 with a potluck dinner at Nancy Kay's house. Nancy Kay has prepared boxes for each of the homes which will be picked up the night of the pre-walk at her house by the members who will be hosting gardens on Friday evening. The boxes will be left with the owner of the garden so the hosts for Saturday will have them on site. June 22nd is the alternate day if we are rained out on the 21st.

Garden Maintenance: Kathy Blackburn reports that some of the left-over plants from the plant sale will be planted in Arthur's Park on Friday June 23rd.
