Grow Veggies in the Winter?



Are you itching to grow something at this time of year but outdoor gardening is 6 weeks, or more, away? I've had fun recently taking the root end of vegetables, like the white part on green onions with the roots

attached, and watching them sprout in a little bit of water. I also cut the end of a romaine lettuce, placed it in a shallow bowl of water, barely covering the end with water and placed it in a sunny window. The photo shows the plants emerging after just one week! Once the "rescued" greens have developed roots,

pot up in small containers of potting soil.

White Vinegar in the Garden?

- Kills Ants

With the exception of a handful of plants that really love acid, most plants will be harmed by vinegar's acetic qualities. Take care when spraying a solution that contains vinegar directly onto your plants, as it can strip their protective coating.

Proposed Amendment of the Milford Garden Club Bylaws Terri Hardick

Milford Garden Club Members:

I am requesting an amendment to the Article VII Dues, Section III because, as they currently read, the membership dues are prorated to reflect payment of \$2.50 for each month from January through May. The Milford Garden Club does not have meetings in January and February. At the prorated rate, the dues would be a maximum of \$7.50 if a new member joined January through May. I always receive payments from new members for the full \$30/\$40 membership fee. I have been calling and telling them that they paid too much and have to request a new check. This feels petty and requires extra paperwork for the membership chair and the treasurer. I have included the bylaws as they currently read and the proposed amendment below.

Please review the proposed amendment. The Milford Garden will vote on this amendment at the April meeting.


MILFORD GARDEN CLUB BYLAWS

ARTICLE VII – DUES SECTION III

Members joining prior to January 1 shall pay full annual dues. Members joining after January 1 shall pay dues prorated of \$2.50 per month based on the number of meetings remaining prior to May 1.

AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE VII – DUES SECTION III

Members joining prior to January 1 shall pay full annual dues. Members joining January through May shall pay full annual dues for the fiscal year which begins September 1 and ends August 31.
