To create a sensory garden you should consider all five scenes.

Sight Combine a mixture of colors and textures to create visual appeal in the garden. Warm colors like red, oranges and yellows promote energy, and cool colors like blues, purples and white promote restfulness and tranquility. Gazing globes, sculptures and garden stakes also add interest!

Sound For a sense of tranquility consider adding different elements of naturally occurring sounds. Adding a bird bath will welcome our friends of flight and their gentle sounds. Enjoy the sound of trickling water from a fountain or bird bath, and the peaceful songs from windchimes.

Touch Think texture when creating a touch friendly sensory garden. Try plants that are soft, fuzzy, rough, prickly, and springy. Use smooth and rough stones around the garden for touching.

Smell Include both subtle and strong scents in your garden like creeping thyme, while mixing Roses, Lilac Hyacinths, Jasmine and Lavender for a mixture of fragrance. Spread out your most fragrant plants to not overwhelm!

Taste Explore taste in your garden by adding edible flowers, fruits, and veggies. Herbs like basil, mint, tarragon and cilantro taste (and smell) divine.





New Home for Arthur's Park Birds

The first birdhouse was successfully erected on June 3, in approximately the same location as the original. The two-part post was installed 42" down below ground in about 12" of concrete at the bottom of the posthole, ensuring that frost won't heave the post out of the ground over time. The post itself remains unpainted until it thoroughly dries later this summer (paint does not adhere well to damp treated posts.)





Birdhouse #2, the single level eight-sided one, was taken down the same day. Its post was riddled with carpenter ants, the damage from which would have likely crumbled and cracked it within a year. The good news is that, except for the base, most of it is in solid shape and can be reused with minor repairs, new glue, reinforcement and paint. The base needs to be re-built and a new post assembled.

Your Opinion Matters!

Many of our members have had issues at our meetings hearing our speakers. Currently the Club has a Karaoke machine with plug in microphones as our sound system. It is heavy to transport, weighing about 15 pounds and many of the speakers declined to use the microphone because it tethered them to the machine so they could not move freely around the




room. We also have two wireless microphone receivers with battery powered microphones but we do not have a transmitter (speaker system, except for the karaoke machine) so they can be used. I spent time with a sound expert at Best Buy this past week and brought our equipment so he can see what we had and to help me understand what we would need to have not only for our meetings but to use at the Division meeting we are hosting in September.

Here are the findings:

We could use the wireless microphone system we currently have but we need to buy two speakers because the Karaoke machine is not powerful enough to broadcast the sound to the entire room at Beacon Hill. The cost of each speaker is \$169. so that would be an expenditure of \$338. For our meetings at the senior center, we would need only one speaker

with our current equipment—theoretically. We did not test the equipment to see the sould quality as this was an information gathering trip and my focus is on the sound system for division.

I am not a sound system expert by any stretch, but I started thinking about alternatives. After searching for sound system experts, I found a list of companies that provide sound systems for weddings, meetings and events such as what we are hosting. I made some calls and talked to several companies. I was most impressed by Josh from Light up the Sound based in Holly. He is familiar with Beacon Hill and has done the sound systems for two



Josh sent a contract to me and I forwarded it to the Board for their review. Josh would provide two speakers and the projection Screen for our event and he will be at the event, setting up the sound system and will be there during the event to manage the sound system and the interface with the presenters power point and our projector. His fee is \$200 to provide the sound and technical expertise for our event.

Lee Doyle and I will meet with Josh during the next two weeks to review the contract with him and make some minor adjustments in the Club's best interest.

I have also discussed this with the Board members and they are all in favor of hiring Josh from Light up the Sound to work at our Division meeting. The only question is if we needed approval for the expenditure. I have reviewed the By -laws and it appears that this would fall under the budget of the VP of Meetings and Programs. It also states in the By-Laws that if the budget of the VP of meetings and Programs (M&P) is not exhausted during the budget period, it will be carried forward to the next budget year. Since the budget for M&P was not used up during the last two budget years, there is money in this budget to pay for this expense and therefore would not need a vote from the general membership however, I am sending this so that you can voice your opinion. Please let me know if you are either in favor or opposed to hiring Light up the Sound for the Division meeting.

Check out Arthur's Park. One of the tree birdhouses to be restored or rebuilt has been installed. Joe Gawle is working on number two.

The treasurer's financial report is \$16,796.00.

The net income for the 2024 Garden Walk is \$5,788.23. Advertising brought in \$1,900; Presale tickets brought in \$885; residual plants and garden market items from our annual Plant Sale brought \$153; vendors \$175; basket raffle \$265; and general ticket sales \$3,300. Total expenses amounted to \$1,350. Directional signs cost \$400 but are being charged to the club's general expenditures and not to the 2024 Garden Walk. The co-chairpersons thanked Nancy Nordin for her great effort in procuring the ads for the Garden Walk book. The co-chairpersons, Karol LaHaie and Diane DeVincent also recognized the following members for their contribution to a successful Garden Walk: Sue Grifor, Sue Tomkins, Barb Amey, Susan Absher, Linda Becker, Nancy Kay, Al & Pat Coppersmith, Shelley Dale, Bobbi Kuschel, Brook Qualman, and Linda Smith.

Members Isabel Davis, Amy Sonk and Ron Krueger were thanked for opening up their gardens to the public.

Sue Grifor gave an update on the seed library at the Milford Library. She has explored other seed libraries in the area and prefers the binder style used by Wixom and Walled Lake. Her ideal manner of housing seeds at the library is using an old card catalog and asked members to watch out for one. The librarian for Adult Services is using a kiosk and hasn't been convinced to used another alternative. She has acquired seeds from libraries and other sources. Sue is waiting for her to complete her kiosk with holders before the MGC helps organize the seeds. She also mentioned the librarian who heads children's services was receptive to our help.

Isabel Davis is holding two craft club meetings: the wood transfer on July 18 and the cement leaf on August 8. Watch for her emails about materials needed for both projects.

The vintage MGC flag that was presented at the Spring Division Meeting in Saginaw will be on display in the reception area of Beacon Hill when we host the fall meeting.

Lisa Willard made a motion to offer a one-year complimentary membership to those people who opened up their gardens on our 2024 Garden Walk. Beth Scciberras seconded the motion. All members approved.

Karol LaHaie is hosting Regular Tea Time at her home at noon on July 24, and Beki Franchock is hosting the afternoon Tea time at her home on August 28 at 2 pm.

Bobbi Kuschel, Martha Klemmer, and Jan Niebauer were recognized for a 25-year longevity award.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:38 pm.
