

Holly Bush

The holly bush (ilex aquifolium) is a great addition to the Michigan garden, particularly if you are looking for something with year-round interest. With their glossy green



leaves and bright red berries, hollies provide seasonal beauty while being easy to grow and attracting a variety of birds.

Types of Holly: When choosing holly, there are two types to consider: evergreen and deciduous. Evergreen hollies are your classic, year-round green holly bush. They have bright red berries paired with shiny green leaves, making them perfect for winter interest in the garden. They're also great for privacy hedges and their berries provide food for birds in winter. Deciduous hollies, such as the Michigan native variety Winterberry (ilex verticillata) lose their leaves in fall. Later in the season, the bare branches become packed with bright red berries that stand out beautifully in the snowy landscape.

How To Grow and Care for Holly:

Holly bushes are relatively easy to care for, making them an excellent choice for beginner and seasoned gardeners alike.

Sunlight: Holly grows best in full sun to part shade.

Soil: They prefer acidic soil that drains well. Winterberry likes soil that stays a bit moist.

<u>Watering:</u> Water regularly until your plant is established. Mulching helps to keep the soil moist.

<u>Pruning:</u> Prune in late winter when the plant is dormant. Prune to control shape and remove any dead or dying branches, but never more than 1/3 of the plant at a time.

<u>Pollination:</u> In order to produce an abundance of berries, hollies require both a male and female plant. Be sure to plant a male plant within 30 feet of a female plant.

Using Holly in the Landscape:

Holly works well in many garden settings. Evergreen Holly is great for privacy hedges or background plants. Deciduous Holly, such as Winterberry, is perfect for adding color and interest to your winter garden. Holly also attracts birds, making them a great addition to a wildlife-friendly garden.

Final Thoughts:

Holly bushes are an easy way to add color and interest to your garden all year long. Winterberry, in particular, is a fantastic choice for Michigan gardens. With its

President's Report:

Nancy Nordin had surgery on November 13th.

- Shelley Dale's surgery was successful and is progressing.
- The status of the WNF&GA was in our newsletter. There will be money still available from endowments and grants available for projects.
- There is a Philadelphia Flower Show & Gardens Tour on March 3 7, 2025 for people interested. There are
 no business meetings, just a fun trip
- The Holiday Party will be on December 12th. The theme is Childhood Memories. Sign-up sheets are on the table. To contribute, think about how things were decorated in your past, bring vintage items and centerpieces to contribute. Food will be provided by The Highland House. We pick it up and set it up with helpers.
- There is a new password to access "Members Only" section of the MGC website The new password is in the replacement Year Book.
- Remember to send a picture for the pictorial directory.
- Take home your nice nametag from the division meeting (on table).
- An Email was sent out to members about seed saving. Sue Grifor brought envelopes to put your garden seeds

- The Lee House is a place for women who are developmentally disabled. It was established by a woman with a daughter who had nowhere to go and is partially funded by the state. We provide support from our general funding we receive from member's personal contributions for any use Lee House decides. Mini Teacher Grants & Scholarships: High schools are contacting Linda Sturgeon about the two \$2,000 scholarships for students or four \$500 mini grants we offer teachers in the Huron Valley School System for environmental or landscaping topics. They have until Jan 13, 2025 to apply and Linda has received five applications already. We let them know of our awards on Feb 3rd.

Sweet fennel and bulb fennel can be found in grocery stores. This group will meet again on the second Monday in December (December 9th) at the Milford library to study ginger.

Community Outreach: Sue Grifor

- The Seed Library Spring Kick-Off will be on March 18th with a program in the evening at the Milford Library.
- Save your seeds/ Packets were available at the November meeting or contact Sue.
- We are working with the Children's Librarian on a project: Fairies & Gnomes in the Garden. The event, aimed at 4 to 10-year olds, would be held in early October 2025. At the event children will look for and find the fairies and gnomes. It could be on the grounds of the Milford Historic Museum, or the South Side Park log cabin. Children could make bracelets and crafts, and receive bags for goodies. After children search, they could visit the Milford Historical Museum to get their fairy wings or gnome heads. We will work with the library and Milford Historical Museum. We also could provide supplies to make their own fairy gardens.
- John and Carolyn Schairer will be liaisons from the Milford Historic Society and Isabel Davis who
 chairs our Craft Club would like to be involved.


Things to do in a garden:

- Shoot for comfort, ease and simplicity in the garden.
- Plant what can comfortably tend.
- Don't worry about perfection.
- Design starts it all. Start with a plan. Think about maintenance that allows you to be off your knees and on your feet.
- Think foliage first, flowers second.
- Leave a "maintenance alley" two feet behind your plantings so they are not up against your house.

- Plant in odd numbers. More attractive because the eye separates things that are in even numbers.
- Zig zag. Don't line things up. Curve them and pop some back and forward.
- Give yourself a room with a view so you can be inside looking out.
- Create winter interest with bark, hydrangea blooms.
- Remember different textures. Boulders. Grass, roses. Soft, with hard.
- Put art in the garden.
- Use stepping stones. Leave easy access to hose outlet.
- Always carry a tape measure.
- Think deer resistance needs.
- Scale is important. Think of the size of shrubs compared with house. Create height but don't place in front of windows that block view.
- Cover perennials with buckets when mulching.
- Allow leaves in garden beds over winter to provide shelter for wildlife and bugs over the winter.

Sins and things to avoid in the garden:

- Obsessive weeding disorder
- Don't bare root a plant before planting. Leave soil around it.
- Bind weed is not morning glory.
- Thistle
- Chameleon grass
- Bishops weed
- Horsetail
- To kill weeds in an area over the winter:
 - o Put plastic over weeds in a sunny location and then mulch over it.
 - o Get cardboard, someplace like Costco, and then mulch over it. Don't use landscape fabric.
- Don't put small stones in the garden
- Don't plant a tree deep.
