

Caring for Daffodils After Blooming

Once daffodils finish blooming, don't rush to cut back the leaves. The foliage needs to stay up for at least six weeks so the plant can store energy for next years blooms. If you don't love the look of fading leaves, plant daffodils among perennials like daylilies or Hostas to help disguise them. If your daffodils seem to bloom less



over time, they may be overcrowded. Dig up and divide the large clumps in late summer, then replant the extra bulbs in a new spot. With just a little care, daffodils will reward you with a beautiful show year after year. Their resilience, adaptability, and cheerfulness make them a must have in any garden. Whether you're planting them for their easy care, bright spring color, or deeper meaning, daffodils are the gift that keeps giving.







MINUTES

MILFORD GARDEN CLUB MEMBERS MEETING

March 13, 2025

President Susan Absher:

- One change to minutes for the last meeting: there is no grant for beautification.
- On March 18 from 6:30-8:00 in the Milford library, there will be a lecture on collecting seeds for the new seed library. If you want to attend, sign up in advance on library website under events.
- There has been some disbanding of garden clubs. One in New York, one in Ohio and Romeo and Juliet in Michigan have disbanded. Michigan has by far the most branches in the Woman's National Farm and Garden Association,
- Daffodil Days will be held at the Detroit Yacht club on April 16. There can be 8 people at a table. Highland may have room at a table too, Susan will find out. Let Susan know if you are going and want to sit together. Online reservation allows you to check if you want to sit with your group.
- We will plan a dedication of the new bird houses to be placed in Arthur's Park after we meet with the Village to approve the locations. Two houses are completed now and one will be done by June. We are thinking of having the dedication when we have the members' tour for our Garden Walk in June.
- Susan encouraged all to get any submissions the newsletter to Jackie on or before her deadline.

<u>Treasurer.</u> On behalf of Diane DeVincent, absent from the meeting, it was reported that the current balance is \$14,002.44 balance. Three out of the four mini grant checks have been cashed.

<u>Programs.</u> Nancy Nordin reported that this month we will learn the importance of tree canopy. Coming up, we will hear about the Blue Heron Watershed, and in May the benefit of opossums. In July, Erin Hamilton will come back with mushroom kits for a hands-on experience. If anyone has a mushroom kit with problems, she will replace it.

It was noted that the 990n postcard form was filed on time and proof of filing is in our record file.

<u>Garden Maintenance</u>. Kathy Blackburn invited all to help with spring garden clean -up on May 6th at 9 A.M. The rain date will be on May 7.

<u>Garden Walk</u>. Karol LaHaie reported that two households in the village have dropped out. We are down to three committed, and without additional gardens, we may not be able to have a viable garden walk. If we do have a walk, we will need hostesses. The Garden Walk is scheduled for June 20-21.

<u>Plant Sale.</u> Lisa Hill. It will be held on Saturday June 7th. This will be Lisa's last year to chair the Plant Sale. She is looking for a co-chair this year willing to take over next year. Plant digs in members' gardens will be in early May. If needed, members can ask for help digging.

We will be particular about the types of plants we want to sell, as shoppers are looking for special things. For example, we won't sell Japanese knotweed or Russian sage (too difficult to dig).

PRESENTATION: BENEFITS OF AN URBBAN TREE CANOPY

Presented by Bill Lawrence, President of ReLeaf Michigan

Bill is a certified arborist – and owns Urban Forestry Consultants, LLC of Ann Arbor and has 45 years of experience in the field.

ReLeaf plants trees to rebuild Michigan's urban and rural canopies, educates the public on the value of trees, and partners with community groups on tree-related projects and plantings.

They share their knowledge with communities and since 1988 they have planted 33,500 trees in 709 Michigan communities.

Michigan is losing 4,000 acres of tree cover each year and less 25% are being replaced.

This is causing runoff problems, loss of infrastructure and health benefits costing \$96 million per year.

Urban tree canopy is the footprint of the land covered by combined branches and leaves of the standing trees in the area. Individual tree canopy is the spread of the crown of each tree. The urban tree canopy is important in solving several problems: purification of the air, energy savings, increased home values, clean water, community health and the safety of neighborhoods.

Economic Benefits: 100 trees equal 1000 air conditioners, reducing cooling costs. A tree-lined street could be worth 25% higher value. Trees are the only part of a city's infrastructure that appreciates over time. (vs utilities, streets, sidewalks). Trees boost economy of a *downtown as people stay and shop longer and spend 9-12% more*.

Social Benefits:

- Increases a sense of community and togetherness.
- Crime is lower, people walk more. Reduces skin cancer and respiratory diseases.
- Acts as a de-stresser.

Environmental Benefits:

- Reduces noise pollution by 37%
- Reduces heat by 10%
- Improves air quality by absorbing nitrogen dioxide, carbon monoxide and ozone.
- Filters water before it reaches our rivers, lakes and groundwater.

Considerations in Planning:

Diversity important. Follow the 10-20-30 rule: 10% of any species, 20% of any genus, and 30% of any family. If homogenously planted and a species is impacted it's destructive. Examples: Dutch Elm Disease or Emerald Ash Borer. There often are too many maples.

Choose right tree for right place. Get a soil test. Don't plant under wires or close to a house.

Don't pave over a root zone (the width of the tree's canopy.

Reduce the Urban Heat Island Effect (heat, air quality, water impairment in urban are

Understand the value of trees. Go to www. Treebenefits.com/calculator. Plug in zip code.

An urban tree canopy assessment is a good idea. The desired canopy in cities is and average of 40% - 50% in suburbs.

Tree provided more than half million dollars in benefits.

Root zone is as wide as the top branches. Don't allow digging.

Don't pave over a root zone.

Suggested Trees that do well in Michigan:

- Sweetgum (Southern Lower Peninsula)
- Native, such as Red Oak, White Oak, Burr Oak, Pin Oak.
- Sugar Maple, Silver Maple. Be aware that the Red Maple is softer and can suffer storm damage. The Autumn Blaze Maple is the toughest of the maples.
- Basswood
- Linden
- Dogwood
- Sycamore
- Ash
- Ann Arbor Planted Honey Locusts. Their small leaves go down drains without damage.
- Swamp White Oak tolerates compacted soils or wet soils
- Planted too many Bradford Pear trees. They are experiencing a serious fungus right now.
- Black Walnut can't do well with other trees or gardens. Excretes something

We could host a community tree planting event. ReLeaf hosts 29-30 per year: they supply and deliver the trees for the group to plant.

ReLeaf sponsors something called the Michigan Big Tree Hunt, now running through August 22, 2025. People look for the largest tree of a species. You can take a picture, enter it and a staff member will inspect and measure the trunk to qualify it. The biggest of a species reported by anyone 16 or older, 15 or younger receives a prize and celebration in Lansing.


